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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 28TH FEBRUARY 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 28th February 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Worcestershire Breast Unit Haven (WBUH) started as a new charity on 1 March 2016 following the successful completion of the breast unit which had been supported by a different charity (Worcestershire Breast Unit Campaign (WBUC), under the auspices of the Worcestershire Hospitals Charitable Trust) whose objects had been to raise capital for the building. WBUH was founded to raise funds for ongoing support of breast cancer patients and their families in Worcestershire in that unit. The charity's objects are to provide support in cases of medical, financial emotional or practical need for:

Anyone resident in Worcestershire or under the care of Worcestershire Hospitals NHS Trust (WHNHST) who are suffering from or at risk of suffering from Breast Cancer

Their families and dependents

To support scientific research into the causes of breast cancer and publish results that are useful

To otherwise relieve sickness by prevention or treatment

To promote education of the public in relation to prevention and treatment.

The short term and longer-term aims and objectives.

WBUH aims to continue to raise sufficient money to offer a complementary therapy services package for all breast cancer patients in Worcestershire. WBUH intends also to provide some essentials such as mastectomy bras to patients who are unable to afford these, and to further support NHS staff with training where this is not available in the NHS and improve the services offered in the breast unit. WBUH will make capital purchases to promote the charity's objectives where funding of these is not the responsibility of the NHS.

WBUH is also aiming to raise funds in order to create a new facility at the Worcester Royal Hospital site that will provide additional space for its activities.

The aims for the charity are to:

Offer a package of five complementary therapy sessions for each patient diagnosed with breast cancer, tailored to their individual needs.

Offer additional sessions, where possible, where needs are within agreed additional support criteria.

Continue to fund Worcestershire patients who receive Breast Cancer Haven ("BCH") services elsewhere (Hereford or Solihull) Provide essentials, as outlined above, for patients suffering financial hardship.

Support breast unit staff with training needs not provided by the NHS

Purchase capital items not provided by the NHS where these support the aims of the charity.

Significant activities

We have a full-time fundraising manager and two 12-hour a week fund raising assistant/administrators. We also have a freelance PR specialist who works on our social media & PR 2 days a month. Our fundraising strategy continues to be to encourage and support individuals and community groups to raise funds for us.

During the year under review we have been able to maintain the funds available for patients treated in Worcestershire. Each patient is offered a course of therapies, which are provided by BCH. In some circumstances we also fund those patients who choose to travel to the Hereford or Solihull Haven facilities. We have also been able to set aside some funds to be able to provide additional therapy sessions in cases of specific need.

During the year ended 28 February 2019 BCH had appointments with approximately 28% of the patients coming through the Unit

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Public benefit

The main activities undertaken during the period to further the charity's purpose for the public benefit include: continuing to provide complimentary therapies to breast cancer patients. Each patient has a tailor-made programme that suits their individual needs,

supporting others fundraising on our behalf,

continuing to develop our social media skills to maintain contact with all our supporters and promote events,

continuing to further our links with the local press to raise the profile of our work,

providing other services to support breast cancer patients such as 'well-being' evenings,

funding relevant training for NHS staff to improve the service for breast cancer patients where this is not available from the NHS itself.

funding patients to attend the University of Worcester lifestyle programme, maintaining garden space by the unit for the enjoyment of patients, and

purchasing other items of equipment within the unit to improve the visitors' experience.

The Trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in managing the activities of the charity.

Volunteers

All the Trustees are volunteers and claim no remuneration. WBUH is fortunate to have a very dedicated group of loyal supporters who give of their time to fundraise for the charity. The strategy is to support others to fund raise for us. Without the many dedicated volunteers, WBUH would not be able to offer services to breast unit patients.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Between 1March 2018 and 28 February 2019 we raised just under £200,000, which includes £22,500 towards the new build project. In the same period we spent approximately £53,500 on staff, day-to-day office running costs, costs related directly to our fundraising such as flyers and online donation site fees.

We have funded £65, 915 of treatments in the period. Since the year end we continue to fund these at a cost of circa £6,000 per month in collaboration with BCH. In addition, we have spent a total £4,727 on funding the University of Worcester Lifestyle course, and £1,714 on maintaining the garden area and music for the unit to assist in providing a good ambience within the unit overall.

We continue to monitor and develop our fundraising strategy.

Fundraising activities

Our aim is to support others to fundraise for us. In addition to this broad fundraising approach we also raise some funds via the sale of refreshments and other items in the breast unit, selling small items at events where possible and running smaller events such as Dog walks and Evening Talks at the Breast Unit.

We also apply to Trusts and Foundations for funds. We pay for one day a week of a Trust fundraiser working for Breast Cancer Haven to work on our behalf.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

Our principal funding comes from events run by our supporters, trust grants and the many donations received.

Reserves policy

Given the inherent uncertainty in fundraising income and the need to ensure continuity of service, the Trustees have agreed that the charity should aim to retain a reserve of circa £50,000 to cover future overheads and known liabilities. This is considered adequate to enable the charity to meet its commitments and take appropriate action to depending upon varying fundraising levels. This reserve forms part of the general reserve.

The charity holds the following restricted reserves:

Garden Fund £ 4,498 - being funds donated for use of design and maintenance of the garden New Build Fund £22,500 – being funds donated for use in delivering the new build project

FUTURE PLANS

We plan to continue to offer a package of complementary therapy to all breast cancer patients in Worcestershire and to support patients and staff as outlined above. We will continue to evaluate the charity's activities and review plans in the light of the results.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The governing document of the charity is the Memorandum and Articles of Association establishing the company under company legislation. The Governing Document is dated 11 February 2016. By operation of law all, Trustees are Directors under the Companies Act 2006 and all Directors are Trustees under Charities legislation and have responsibilities, as such, under both company and charity legislation.

Recruitment and Appointment of New Trustees

At the annual general meeting Mrs D Oliver and Mr S Thrush will be retiring by rotation, and will be proposed for reappointment.

Organisational structure

The charity has six Trustees. We employ a full time fundraising manager (Alexandra Craigie), and two part time (12 hours a week) support fund raising assistant/administrators (Jacquie Clements and Elaine Scrafton).

Related parties

The charity has a close relationship with Breast Cancer Haven. BCH Trustee (Lord Rockley) is also a trustee of WBUH.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES 1.

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
